





Short facts about KTH Royal Institute of Technology

- Established 1827 in Stockholm, the capital of Sweden and home of the Nobel Prize
 - 18,000 students, 3,900 employees and 1,950 researchers from more than one hundred nations
 - Primarily a research university. One of the most competitive universities in Europe for receiving research funding
 - English official language for studies on master's level

KTH alumni hold prominent positions

- Graduates find careers in international companies like Ericsson, IBM, ABB, Astra Zeneca and Microsoft
 - In 2009, more than half of the graduates had accepted jobs before completing their studies
 - 7 out of 10 KTH graduates have their dream job

 - Education focused on problem solving, in close collaboration with research and industry
 - KTH graduates are in high demand internationally
 - 86% of graduates have a job relevant to their degree within 6 months

Courses for exchange students

- KTH offers a wide range of Bachelor's and Master's degrees with over 1,000 courses taught in English
 - More than 50 Master's programmes in English
 - Courses consist of lectures, seminars, laboratory work and individual studies
 - Exchange students can choose courses quite freely within their subject area, provided they meet the prerequisites.

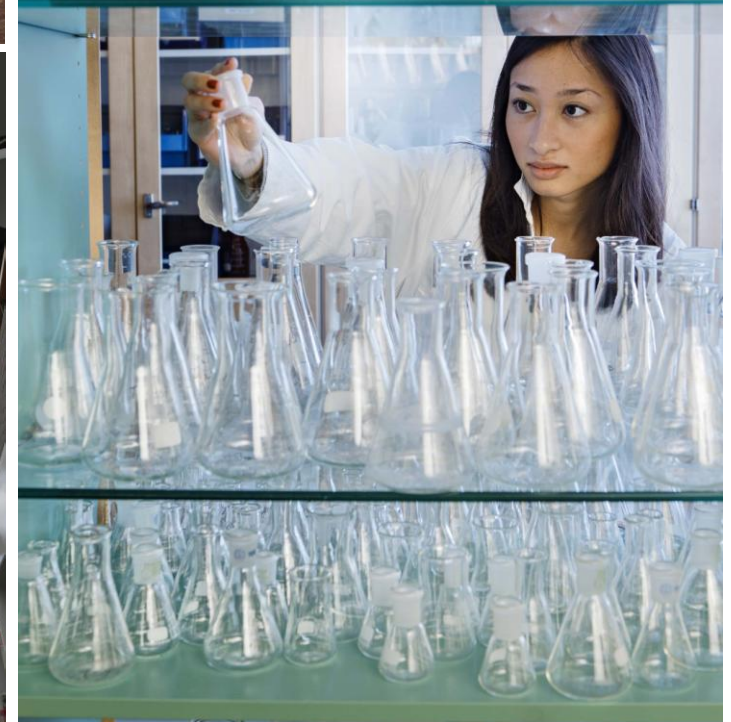

Application process and admission

- All Exchange students must be selected for eligibility by their home university
 - Selected exchange students apply to KTH via an online application form, which is then completed with a paper application and required documents
 - Application deadline April 15 for studies starting in August/September
 - Application deadline October 15 for studies starting in January/February
